What Does a Medical Assistant Do?

Medical Assistants play a vital role in the management and efficient operations of doctors' offices, clinics, and other medical facilities.

Medical Assistants are unlicensed individuals who perform non-invasive routine technical support services under the supervision of a licensed physician and surgeon, podiatrist,



physician assistant, nurse practitioner, or nurse midwife in a medical office or clinic setting. The supervisor must be on the premises in order for the medical assistant to perform those non-invasive technical support services. Medical assistants may obtain "certified" status through private agencies approved by the Medical Board of California.

Administrative duties may include welcoming patients, scheduling appointments, maintaining medical records, bookkeeping, insurance billing and coding. Clinical duties may include recording vital signs and medical histories, preparing patients for examination, assisting the physician during an

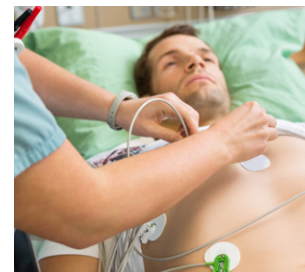
exam, collecting blood and other lab specimens, and administering medications as directed.

Facts About Medical Assisting & Job Opportunities

According to a document entitled "Key Findings, 2014, Health Occupations in California," prepared by the Centers of Excellence, the need for Medical Assistants in the ambulatory healthcare and nursing and residential care employer settings was expected to see a projected growth rate of 5%, with a total of 4,750 job openings over the subsequent 12-month period.

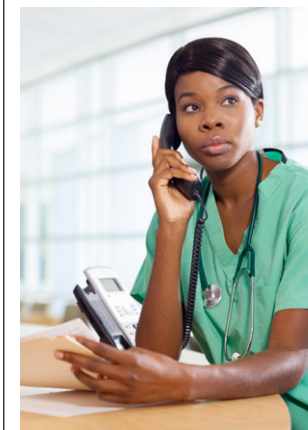


programs in medical assisting such as those offered in postsecondary vocational schools or community colleges.

Many employers prefer or require certification. There are three certifying agencies that are recognized in California. The American Association of Medical Assistants (AAMA) awards the Certified Medical Assistant (CMA-AAMA) credential, The American Medical Technologists (AMT) agency awards the Registered Medical Assistant (RMA) credential, and the California Certifying Board for Medical Assistants awards the CCMA credential. Most students desiring certification attend and graduate from an accredited medical assisting program. This prepares them to pass a certification exam given by one of the three accrediting organizations. Others are trained on the job and may take a refresher course to assist them in preparing for the exam.

- Great communication skills (verbal & written), bilingual desired.
- Ability to work both independently and as a team.
- Ability to follow directions, multi-task and observe details.
